




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Overview of the BA in Psychology

The department of psychology offers a Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree in Psychology, which provides training in the study of human behavior and mental processes. It is designed for students preparing for careers in psychology, health care, education, urban affairs, government, research, and industry. Psychologists study the physical, cognitive, emotional, and social aspects of human behavior. From among the course offerings, students are encouraged to take a broad sample, but may also choose to take more than one course within a specialty area. The degree also enables students to pursue graduate education in such areas of psychology:

Notes: This four-year curriculum map should be used as a guide. Students must meet with their Advisor on a regular basis to discuss their degree progress and review their academic plan. Students should check the MEC website for the latest in degree requirements. Students who meet designated criteria can accelerate progress by taking winter or summer courses.

*At the associate level, PSYC 301 is highly recommended as a substitute for PSYC 224. Official substitution approval will be provided by the Psychology Department. Students who take PSYC 301 at the associate level rather than PSCY 224 will free up space for an Open Psychology Elective at the bachelor's level.

College Option Courses: The above sequence includes 12 College Option credits. For students who earn an associate degree, only six College Option credits are required. Six of the College Option credits above can be converted into Open Elective credits.
